Overview

No matter what career choice you make now or in the future, reading and writing will be integral components to your success, and even to your understanding of the world and personal enjoyment. The purpose of the English 3 class is to provide students with the knowledge and tools to become better readers, writers and critical thinkers. In addition to standard reading and writing, students will engage in activities to improve their grammar, vocabulary, interpersonal and presentation skills. *Complete submersion in technology via use of iPads and the SmartBoard will prepare students for careers in the 21st century.*

Eleventh grade English is traditionally considered a study of American writers.

Instructional Philosophy

In order for students to develop these necessary skills, students are expected to participate in class activities and discussions, complete their work to the best of their ability, turn their work on in time, and work cooperatively with their peers to achieve common goals. I will do my absolute best to teach and engage all students; in return, I expect the best possible effort from all students.

Classroom Rules

In addition to TCTC student rules, I have three simple rules that pretty much cover all aspects of student behavior within the boundaries of my classroom:

1. Be prompt.
2. Be prepared.
3. Be polite.

In addition, students should be aware of the following items:

- Cell phone usage during class is prohibited.
- Piercings, other than the ears, must be removed or covered up.
- All other materials you might be carrying with you, including **purses**, should be placed under your table.
- All students must utilize the sign-in, sign-out sheet near the door when leaving the classroom for any reason, and when a student is tardy to class.
- Do not abuse restroom privileges. Please only request to leave class in an emergency situation. Use only the restrooms across the hall from my classroom.

If you have a long walk from your previous class, please let me know.

- **Please do not bring food or drink to class.** Because this is an iPad classroom, this rule will be strictly enforced!
- Maintain a positive attitude: eye-rolling, heaving sighing, and pouting are not appreciated by me or your peers.
- Do your work the first time. Non-absence related late work is eligible only for half-credit within 48 hours of the original assignment. No credit will be given after 48 hours.

Assignment Assessment Description

'A' work is an excellent assignment with very few errors that meets and goes beyond all of the requirements. It is evident to all that serious time and effort was spent to show understanding of a skill or lesson.

'B' work is a great assignment with a few errors that show some lack of effort. A few requirements of the assignment are not fully met; however it is evident that you understand a skill or lesson.

'C' work is an average assignment. Errors are significant and show a mediocre level of effort. Several requirements of the assignment are not met and you do not show complete evidence of understanding a skill or lesson.

'D' work is a poor assignment. It has many errors that show a great lack of effort. Most elements of the assignment are not met and you show minimal evidence of understanding a skill or lesson.

'F' work is incomplete with chronic errors or not attempted at all. There is no evidence of understanding a skill or lesson.

- Utilize and improve reading skills through various works of literature, including novels, poetry, news items, and other non-fiction.
- Sharpen critical thinking skills by analyzing literature.
- Work collaboratively with peers to improve interpersonal skills needed in the workforce, during continuing education, and the "real world."
- Develop writing skills that allow students to produce documents that address various subject matter and audiences, use correct conventions, and demonstrate voice.
- Use research skills to collect, analyze, and present data.
- Utilize research correctly and effectively during the writing process.
- Improve speaking and listening skills through the presentation of student projects.
- Read independently to improve self-monitoring and comprehension skills.
- Participate in class discussions that enhance the subject matter.
- Improve grammar skills by keeping a "writer's notebook," and completing short grammar reviews.
- Expose students to the technology skills they need to become productive members of this 21st century society.

The iPad Classroom

This project will initiate an intensive study of technology and student learning through tablet technology, providing research and feedback for future initiatives. This device will be used for classroom activities, producing differentiation of instruction and learning and providing students with an **active**, digital environment in which to connect with their work.
